Assembly Sponsored Public Bodies

1. What is an Assembly Sponsored Public Body (ASPB)?

Assembly Sponsored Public Bodies (ASPBs) are the Assembly's non-departmental public bodies (NDPBs) or quangos.

An NDPB is a:

"body which has a role in the processes of national Government but is not a Government Department or part of one and which accordingly operates to a greater or lesser extent at arm's length from Ministers".

NDPBs operate independently of Ministers, or in the case of ASPBs independent of the Assembly. The ASPBs receive direct funding from the Assembly but are not formally part of the same organisation and therefore operate to a greater or lesser extent at "arm's length" under their own legal powers.

The chief executive of each Executive ASPB is directly accountable to the Permanent Secretary for the regularity, propriety and value for money of expenditure from the budget allocation received from the Assembly Government. In addition to using its formal statutory powers, the Assembly Government monitors and influences the work of ASPBs through administrative tools including the approval of corporate and business plans, and 'remit letters' which set out the Assembly's future priorities and targets for the body concerned.

There are three main types of ASPB: Executive, Advisory and Tribunal.

Executive ASPBs

Executive ASPBs have executive, administrative, commercial or regulatory functions. They carry out prescribed functions within a Government framework. Each has a varying degree of operational independence.

Advisory ASPBs

Advisory ASPBs provide advice to the Assembly on particular issues. They are normally set up by administrative action and are typically staffed by officials from within the Assembly.

Tribunal ASPBs

Tribunals settle disputes and appeals on various topics.

They will be merged with their sponsor departments and will become part of the Assembly administration.

ELWa – The National Council for Education and Training for Wales

Established: 2001, under the *Learning and Skills Act 2000*. ELWa superseded the Education and Training for Wales and the Training and Enterprise Councils in Wales.

Functions:

The body's statutory name is the National Council for Education and Training for Wales. On 01 April 2001, it took over the majority of the functions of the four Training and Enterprise Councils and the Further Education Funding Council for Wales. It assumed responsibility for funding, planning and promoting all post-16 education and training in Wales with the exception of Higher Education. The National Council - ELWa has



responsibility for further education, private and voluntary sector training provision, adult continuing education and, with effect from April 2002, sixth form provision.

It took over the functions of the National Rivers Authority, Her Majesty's Inspectorate of Pollution, Waste Regulation Authorities and some parts of the Department of the Environment. Environment Agency Wales became an Assembly sponsored body in 1999.

Functions:

Environment Agency Wales is in a special position - it is an Assembly Sponsored Public Body, while also being part of the corporate Environment Agency for England and Wales. It obtains much of its funding and direction from the Welsh Assembly Government, and reports back to them. The Environment Agency has wide responsibilities for managing the environment including: acting as a champion for the environment; reducing pollution and enforcing pollution legislation; overseeing the management of waste, water resources and freshwater fisheries; reducing the harm caused by flooding; influencing others to achieve positive environmental outcomes by changing attitudes and behaviour.
