THE 2003 ASSEMBLY ELECTION RESULTS

This statistical note draws together information on the results of the election to the National Assembly for Wales on 1 May 2003 and provides some comparisons with results from the previous Assembly election in 1999 and with recent General Election results. The figures have been taken from a number of sources.

1 SUMMARY

The overall picture of seats won by each party in May 2003 is given in Table 1.

Labour won exactly half of the seats in the Assembly, two more than in 1999. Plaid Cymru won 5 fewer seats than in 1999 – losing 4 constituency seats and 1 regional. The Conservatives won 2 more seats than in 1999 both from the regional vote. This leaves the Conservatives, with 11 seats in 2003, within 1 seat of Plaid Cymru. The Liberal Democrats kept the same number of seats and, for the first time, an independent gained a constituency seat in an Assembly election.

2 SHARE OF VOTE

The share of the vote in the regional ballots was slightly different from that in the constituencies with a higher proportion, just under 12 per cent, voting for parties other than the four main parties (Table 2). In the constituency ballot Labour took 40 per cent of the vote while Plaid Cyrmu and the Conservatives took 21 and 20 percent respectively. Whilst Labour increased their share of the constituency vote from the previous Assembly election by over 2 percentage points and the Conservatives by 4 percentage points, the Plaid Cymru share fell by 7 percentage points. The Liberal Democrats saw a small increase in their share of the vote compared to the 1999 election.

Plaid Cymru also saw their share of the vote fall in the regional ballot from 30 to just under 20 per cent. The Conservatives and parties other than the four main parties made the most gains in the regional ballot.

The Assembly elections show a different pattern of voting from the 2001 General Election when Labour took nearly 50 per cent of the vote and Plaid Cymru took 14 per cent.

There are 46 Members returning to the Assembly, although Helen Mary Jones returns as a Regional Member having lost her constituency seat, and 14 new Members. Of the new Members, 9 are constituency Members and 5 represent regional seats.

4 RESULTS BY REGION

Breakdowns of the results by party and region are given in Tables 5, 6 and 7. Liberal Democrat seats are spread fairly evenly across the regions. Labour picked up fewer seats in Mid and West Wales than elsewhere while Plaid Cymru were most successful in Mid and West Wales and North Wales. The Conservatives faired best in South Wales East and Mid and West Wales.

5 VOTES CAST

A full breakdown of the votes cast, together with turnout and majority figures, is given in Tables 8 and 9.

6 TURNOUT

The average turnout (constituency and regions) was 38.2 per cent, down 8 per cent from the 1999 Assembly election and 23 percentage points lower than in the 2001 general election. Turnout in 2003 ranged from 24.9 per cent in Alyn and Deeside to 50.4 per cent in Ynys Mon. The turnout was generally higher in Mid and West Wales, where it topped 40 per cent in all constituencies, than in other areas. Constituencies in North Wales showed the greatest variation in turnout – those in the North West were over 40 per cent whilst those in the North East were generally below the average. Annex 2 contains a map showing turnout across Wales.

7 MAJORITIES

The largest majority, 11,736 was recorded in the constituency of Blaenau Gwent. The smallest majorities were just 21 votes in Llanelli and 72 in Conwy. Three other constituency Members were returned with majorities of under 1,000.

8 WOMEN MEMBERS

The number of women Members rose to 30 in 2003 with women taking exactly half of the seats in the Assembly. This compares with 18 per cent in the House of Commons and 33 per cent in the Scottish Parliament. The majority of women Members in the Assembly belong to the Labour group and account for 63 per cent of their representatives. Half of the Liberal Democrat group and of Plaid Cymru Members are women (Table 10).






National Assembly for Wales Constituencies
